INTRODUCTION

The Languages and Related Literatures collection is adequate to support the courses taught in the B.A. in English and Foreign Languages and the M.A. for English. Complete conspectus sheets and checklists are available upon request for a more detailed examination of the collection.

HOLDINGS

The Languages and Related Literatures collection contains **71,091** titles in the P 1- PN 9999 call number ranges, including 1,446 e-books. Total monograph expenditures for Languages and Related Literatures from 2012-2017 were \$197,168.20 with 1,388 new titles added. These newer additions comprise 2% of the current Languages and Related Literatures collection.

These numbers represent a snapshot of the collection, as titles are continually being added and withdrawn for collection maintenance and growth. These numbers do not represent additional titles available through e-book databases.

SUMMARY

Strengths:

Total holdings, conspectus evaluation, and checklist comparisons indicate the overall Languages and Related Literatures collection is more than adequate to support the curriculum. Of particular note on the conspectus worksheet are the holdings in the subject areas of Linguistics with 2,331 titles, English with 3,842 titles, Russian literature with 1,340 titles, and Prose fiction with 997 titles.

A review of the journal holdings reveals that the Languages and Related Literatures collection is adequate to support the curriculum.

Weaknesses:

Total holdings, conspectus evaluations, and checklist comparisons indicate that the weakest areas of the Languages and Related Literatures subject areas are: Medieval and modern Greek Language, Early Modern English, Arabic, and Languages of South America.

Recommendations:

The growth rate of the Languages and Related Literatures Collection should be maintained in order to continue providing support for the B.A. in English and Foreign Languages and the M.A. in English. The monograph collection should be generally increased, based on budget, with a strong focus on core and outstanding titles. The periodical collection available via databases is substantial and should be maintained. The weak subject areas (noted above) should also be addressed in future additions to the collection.
