The subject of criminal justice involve many related fields of research. Fields related to criminal justice may include: sociology (including demography and social work), law, psychology, public administration, political science, business (including white collar crime and security issues), education, and even science (including toxicology and substance analysis). Most of print sources (such as books, periodicals) related to Criminal Justice are located on 4th & 10th floor in Houston Cole Library. Electronic sources (such as databases) can be accessed via computer station on each floor.

Books

Books are important sources of basic information on a topic, providing necessary definitions, background information, and historical information. Books provide a foundation for research which can be supplemented by more current information from periodical articles. Books may also contain useful bibliographies which may lead to additional sources of research.

When looking for books, consult the Library of Congress Subject Headings to select the proper term(s) to use as subjects under "Find Books (Library Catalog)". The following table shows U.S. Law in the Library of Congress System:

Older print issues of magazines and journals, usually bound into complete years or volume numbers, are located on 4th & 10th floor Bound Periodical Section. You can also use Library subscribed electronic databases (http://www.jsu.edu/depart/library/graphic/articles.htm) to identify articles on particular topics in magazines, journals, and newspapers. The following are commonly used databases for Criminal Justice: Academic Search Elite, America: History and Life, CQ Researcher, Elsevier ScienceDirect, Expanded Academic ASAP, LegalTrac, NCJRS Abstracts Database, Newspaper Source, ProQuest Databases, PsycINFO, Sociological Abstracts, and Westlaw Campus.
